True Justice

True Justice: Bryan Stevenson's Fight for Equality follows 30 years of Equal Justice Initiative's work on behalf of the poor, incarcerated, and condemned. The film, which won the Emmy Award for Outstanding Social Issue Documentary and a Peabody Award, shares Bryan Stevenson's experience with a criminal justice system that "treats you better if you're rich and guilty than if you're poor and innocent."

Stevenson indicts the U.S. criminal justice system for its role in codifying modern systemic racism and tracks the intertwined histories of slavery, lynching, segregation, and mass incarceration. The film looks at the unfair application of the death penalty based on race and how the court has long-sanctioned inequality, oppression, and violence.
